
## The Kentucky Military Institute: A Proud Chapter in Lyndon's History:

Imagine the crisp morning air on LaGrange Road filled with the sharp commands of drill sergeants and the rhythmic stomp of young cadets marching in perfect formation. For nearly 75 years, that was the everyday soundtrack of Lyndon, thanks to the Kentucky Military Institute (KMI)—one of America's oldest private military preparatory schools.

Founded in 1845 by Colonel Robert T.P. Allen, a West Point graduate and Seminole War veteran, KMI earned its charter from the Commonwealth of Kentucky in 1847. It stood as a mainstay of rigorous academics, ironclad discipline, and military tradition, much like the Virginia Military Institute. After early homes near Frankfort and Mount Sterling, the school found its permanent Kentucky home in 1896 when Colonel C.W. Fowler relocated it to a historic plantation house along LaGrange Road in Lyndon, now the site of The Brook hospital. Cadets in starched uniforms turned the grounds into a living parade field, while the school's unique twist—shifting its winter session to warmer Venice, Florida quarters starting in 1906 which kept athletics thriving year-round and drew national eyes.

KMI wasn't just about drills; it forged leaders who left lasting marks. Seven alumni rose to generals during the Civil War, serving on both Union and Confederate sides. Hollywood legends included Jim Backus (1932), forever remembered as the voice of Mr. Magoo and the wealthy Thurston Howell III on Gilligan's Island. Comedian Fred Willard (1951), had numerous television and film credits like Best in Show and Modern Family. Closer to home, John Y. Brown Jr. (attended) went on to serve as Governor of Kentucky, shaping our state's future and hometown hero Danny Sullivan (1969), race car driver and winner of the 1985 Indianapolis 500.

The school's story ended in 1971 amid declining enrollment, rising costs, and shifting views on military education—its final cadets marched out that summer. Yet the echoes remain: those disciplined footsteps helped build Lyndon's reputation for excellence and community pride.



## Report Streetlight Outages

Reporting streetlight outages in Lyndon through the LG&E-KU “Report a Problem” tool (available at [lge-ku.com/outages/report/streetlight](http://lge-ku.com/outages/report/streetlight)) plays a vital role in maintaining community safety and enhancing quality of life after dark. Functional streetlights help deter crime, improve visibility for drivers and pedestrians to prevent accidents, and ensure safer navigation in neighborhoods, roads, and public spaces. While LG&E conducts regular inspections, they rely on residents to spot issues quickly—since outages often go unnoticed until reported—and prompt notifications allow crews to address problems efficiently during daytime repairs. By taking a moment to submit a report with specific details like location and description of problem, you will also be prompted to select from a list of “who pays for the light”. Choose ‘City’ then type ‘Lyndon’ in the text field. Lyndon residents contribute directly to safer, better-lit streets for everyone.

## Firearm Thefts

At the Lyndon Police Department, we support the right of our citizens to keep and bear arms as guaranteed by the United States and Kentucky constitutions. However, we would like to emphasize our desire for residents to KEEP their firearms. So far in 2026 (through February 17th), Lyndon Police have taken eight stolen firearm reports. Each firearm that is stolen presents the opportunity for that weapon to harm you or someone else. Often, firearms are left unsecured in a vehicle. Sometimes these vehicles are unlocked. This makes them easy targets for thieves who would like to take them from you. Please KEEP your firearms safe and do not leave them unsecured. There are a wide assortment of lock boxes available that can be hidden from thieves. If possible, taking your firearm inside your home at night is the best option. This will help you KEEP your firearms.

## Lyndon Lane Streetscape Completion Update

We appreciate your patience during the Lyndon Lane streetscape reconstruction. Unforeseen delays have left street lighting offline and only 50% of the scope complete. Demolition revealed incorrectly located utilities, necessitating relocation to meet local standards before new curb, gutter, sidewalk, and base work could proceed. Existing lighting service connections were not reusable due to alignment conflicts and poor early-2000s documentation. Winter weather further postponed resumption. Contractors are now returning to finish the remaining segment, including grading, concrete, lighting, restoration, and punch list. Expect intermittent lane closures, flaggers, reduced speeds, and congestion in the work zone once again. Thank you for your support as we complete these essential pedestrian and multimodal improvements.

## Ormsby Lane Improvements

Crews are actively working on Ormsby Lane between New LaGrange Road and Lyndon Lakes Drive to complete the second phase of our road widening and pedestrian safety project. This phase focuses on constructing new sidewalks to seamlessly connect existing segments, enabling safe pedestrian travel along the roadway from Old Whippys Mill Road to New LaGrange Road. In addition, targeted road widening will bring the entire section up to current municipal standards, expanding from its narrowest points of approximately 16 feet to a consistent 22-foot width. These enhancements improve accessibility, enhance safety for walkers and residents, and support Lyndon’s commitment to better infrastructure. We appreciate your patience during construction and ask drivers to slow down, watch for workers, and use caution in the work zone.
